

# STONE WALLS PLANNED FOR ENTRANCES TO BUNINYONG

The Golden Plains Miner 27<sup>th</sup> June 2013 page 8 pictured Ian Salathiel and Barry Fitzgerald from the Buninyong and District Community Association standing at one of the sites proposed for new signage to the entrances to Buninyong. The concept plan has been drawn by **David Turley** of DRT Consulting and involves sawn bluestone and rough natural stone shaped to represent Mt Buninyong. Brushed bronze lettering will be used and solar lighting will light up the signs during the night. Major funding of \$21,000 for the \$34,000 project has been granted from the State Government's Regional Growth Fund along with significant funding from the City of Ballarat, the Buninyong Community Bank and the Friends of the Buninyong Botanical Gardens. The project is expected to begin in July 2013 and be completed by October 2013.

# **VIETNAM WAR TUNNEL RAT**

**Bob Coleman** was featured in a two page article in the *Ballarat Courier June 22<sup>nd</sup> 2013* page 40 describing his time during the Vietnam War when he was one of a select group known as "Tunnel Rats". Mr Coleman was a member of the Engineer Field Troops after joining the

# VICTORIA'S GROUNDWATER RESOURCES MAPPED

A unique project aimed at digitally visualizing Victoria's groundwater resource has won the University of Ballarat a state award. Visualising Victoria's Groundwater (VVG) project has been named the winner of the Victorian iAward for

the regional category. The university will compete against all Australian state and territory winners for the national Regional iAward on August 8.

The project's lead researcher, Dr Peter Dahlhaus, along with technology lead Andrew MacLeod, said the \$2.23 million project was important for the management of a resource that may become scarce. Groundwater is used for town water supply and supports environmental assets like lakes, wetland and rivers so the correct management of groundwater is very important. Dr Dahlhaus said the initiative could only be possible with high-speed broadband that captures, aggregates and spatially depicts Victoria's groundwater systems.

Twenty four years ago, Neil was made aware that the very delicate balance of our planet is being disturbed by human activity.

- (4) Earth's Energy Balance and the concept of "Greenhouse".


It Has Rained in Antarctica! By Neil Cameron

Our Globe is Warming (The Environment says so, and the Logic says so too!)

It never did rain in Antarctica, in Mawson' day, 100 years ago. Neither he nor the other Antarctic explorers of the heroic age—Shackleton, Scott and Amundsen— reported it. It never did rain then; but it has and it does occasionally now along the Antarctic coast in high summer, and the penguins don't like it. At the "other end' of the globe, in 1895, other adventurers, Fridjof Nansen and Hjalmar Johansen had already failed in their attempt to walk to the North Pole from their ship, the deliberately ice-bound *Fram*. They were thwarted at 86° North by enormous ice pressure ridges, plus the southerly drift of the ice on which they were walking north. A century later, it is becoming almost common place for individuals to walk to the North Pole, equipped with immersion gear and kayaks to cross the open- water leads. The Arctic ice has become thinner in winter, and its

summer extent has reduced by 40%. In the South, the Antarctic Peninsula has warmed by several degrees Celsius, and several of its fringing, floating ice shelves have disintegrated over the last decade.

Over the intervening century, between then and now, in the inhabited latitudes between the poles, comprehensive instrumental readings show the near surface temperatures of land and ocean to have risen by three quarters of a degree Celsius (0.75°C.) That may not seem much compared to diurnal temperature ranges of 10-20° Celsius being our common experience; but it has been enough to upset the balance of Nature.



The red bars show the global annual average near-surface temperature anomalies from 1850 to 2009. The error bars show the 95% uncertainty range on the annual averages. The thick blue line shows the annual values after smoothing with a 21 point binomial filter. The dashed portion of the smoothed line indicates where it is influenced by the treatment of the end points. The thin blue lines show the 95% uncertainty on the smoothed curve. Data are from the HadCRUT3 dataset. Annual Dataand smoothed data are available in this format.

### Our globe is warming!

Or is it? Perhaps all of the above is pure fantasy, dreamed up by the control freaks of the lunatic "Left", and supported by climate scientists whose sole motivation is to keep their jobs.

No and Yes.

No! It is not fantasy. Yes! The globe is warming, and the cause is human activity.

The logic, as set out below, says that we, the world community, cannot inject huge quantities of carbon dioxide (CO<sup>2</sup>) into the atmosphere, principally by the burning of fossil fuels, without causing our Globe to warm. Can we deny the logic, or are we guilty of fossilised thinking?

So; the story begins with the atmosphere and its dramatically rising carbon dioxide content.

# Atmospheric Carbon Dioxide and Global temperature.

Historically, as well as logically, global temperature is inextricably linked to the level of atmospheric carbon dioxide. For the last ten thousand years, our Earth has enjoyed a period of relatively benign and stable temperatures referred to as an *inter-glacial*; also known geologically as *the Holocene Period*. Associated with that stable temperature, and the cause of it, there was, over the *Holocene*, a similarly stable content of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere—between 260 and 280 parts per million as measured by volume (ppm).

For times prior to the establishment of monitoring stations on Mauna Loa Hawaii in 1958 and Cape Grim, Tasmania in 1976, ( also Baring Head in New Zealand, and subsequently many stations), the varying composition of the atmosphere over time is measured from air trapped in Antarctic and Greenland ice-cores. Isotopic fractions of various elements in both the trapped air and the ice itself enable the temperature at the time of deposition to be inferred as well. Antarctic ce-core data make it likely that over the last six hundred and fifty thousand years (650,000 yrs), the atmospheric carbon dioxide content has varied between 180 during periods of glaciation, to no more than 300 ppm during the four other *inter-glacials* which occurred over that time-span. At no time did it approach present levels.

(It is unclear whether the low carbon dioxide levels during glacial periods is the cause thereof, or the result. Cold water is able to hold more of it, lowering the air/water equilibrium; but the low CO<sup>2</sup> levels would force the temperature lower, too. Ice-core data from the Russian *Vostok* base in inland Antarctica show the temperature there during periods of glaciation to have been 8°C lower than at the same location during the present *inter-glacial*.)

As said above, during the present *interglacial*, the level of atmospheric CO<sup>2</sup> has been not less than 260ppm, nor higher than 280ppm, implying a state of comparative equilibrium. The present level of 394ppm is therefore quite extraordinary, as is the rate of rise—2ppm annually.

The annual rate of increase is rising. For the first 220 years of the industrial era to 1970, the annual increase averaged 0.20ppm. For the thirty year period 1971 to 2000 the average rate of increase had risen to 1.3ppm per year, and in the decade 2001-2010 the annual rise at Cape Grim and at Mauna Loa was 2.0ppm, or ten times the rate of rise for the first 220 years of industrialisation. Arguing to absurdity, if that 2ppm rate of rise had been consistent over previous time, then the atmospheric content in 1815 would have been zero, and the Duke of Wellington would not have defeated Napoleon at Waterloo, for there would have been no green plants, and in fact no life on earth at all. Obviously, that is an absurd proposition; so the alternative must be true - that the rate of atmospheric carbon dioxide increase must have risen.

Although the Industrial Revolution began nominally in 1750, it is just 250 years since James Watt invented the steam engine in 1763. Since then coal has been increasingly used as an energy source. The petroleum era, its beginning marked perhaps by the conversion of lighthouses from burning whale oil to burning kerosene, only began about 125 years ago (and already there is worry about "peak oil"). The use of natural gas has only become widespread in the last sixty or so years. To get our time-scales in perspective, the coal that we are wont to mine in Queensland and New South Wales dates from the *Permian Period*, over 250 **million** years before the present.

All living things respire, 'burning' carbonaceous materials to gain the energy they require, and emitting carbon dioxide (CO²) into the atmosphere. The stability of its content in the atmosphere during the *Holocene*, prior to 1750, implies that the rate of those emissions must then have been closely matched by the rate of CO² uptake through photosynthesis i.e. by chlorophyll containing green plants, algae and bacteria. Huge amounts (about 120 gigatons) of CO² are thus respired and taken up again annually; but the result, until the advent of the Industrial Revolution, had been a virtual equilibrium between the two processes. That equilibrium has been upset by the burning of fossil fuels, notably coal, and other human activities, such as land use changes and cement production.
