Buninet was formed to provide public access to the internet for people that did not have their own computers and was opened by John Brumby in 2000.

During 2000 Buninyong Uniting Church congregation received a Skills.net grant to establish a community accessible computer facility and provide basic training in computers and use of the internet. The Church Council considered this to be an important means to provide a community service for the residents of Buninyong.

The original Committee consisted of John and Lois Urquhart, Betty Bunting, Larry Thorpe, Greg King and Adrian Claridge.

Alan Mills, Jim Gay and Alan Bennett provided the carpentry skills to alter a room in the Sunday School hall for the computers to be housed in.

We were part of Ballarat Televillage which was an initiative of the City of Ballarat. The agreement with Skills.net required us to train a certain number of people over two years and that the facility opened at times during the week both for lessons and also general access. This requirement was carried out successfully.

During this year attendance has fallen away and it has been uneconomic to continue. On Tuesday 3rd September we held a supper and invited those people who have been part of Buninet over the years to attend. We had a pleasant time sharing stories and memories of the times when Buninet was a "real goer".

The Customer Service desk was a popular attraction at the meeting and we are currently working on responses to all listed community issues.


Graeme Kent has begun to collate the information from the community conversation sessions and has locked in a time for the working group to get together. We ended up with about a dozen people

The Buninyong Men's Shed was formed by a small group of like-minded men about four years ago, and has met in a private shed since then.

About twelve months ago it was decided that we should look for dedicated premises to use and we scoured the town but to no avail. A chance meeting with Councillor Peter Innes led us down the path of working with the City of Ballarat in our search.

The City of Ballarat Community Development Officer, Peter Appleton came with us whilst we searched for suitable premises and through him we were offered the block next to the Lions Shed in Forrest Street where the Tennis clubrooms used to be.

As luck had it, the State Government, through the Department of Human Resources had funds available in the way of grants to assist in the building of a new Men's Shed and the City of Ballarat agreed to act as our Auspice Body in the preparation of our application which was, after several amendments to amendments, submitted. Our sincere thanks must go to Peter Appleton and his staff for the invaluable assistance they gave to us in preparing this submission, and agreeing to act as the managing body if we are successful.

The City of Ballarat has also agreed to provide funding from monies allocated to the Buninyong Community to help us make up any shortfall in building costs. For this, we must thank our Councillor, Peter Innes.

When completed, the Men's Shed will establish a key community facility in the Buninyong and District Precinct. It will be fully accessible to all men who wish to participate in the traditional Men's Shed activities, or are just looking for companionship and a quiet place to relax. The promotion of men's health will be part of our obligation with the co-operation of our local medical facilities, and other health bodies in Ballarat. The new shed will be fully accessible and will include a designated work area with adjoining recreational and kitchen facilities.

The ability to fund this facility on an ongoing basis has been budgeted and the current Shed members are taking on small jobs to generate income. One just recently finished is the building of a "boat" in the grounds of the Scotsburn Primary School.



The "SS Scotsburn" is now a focal point in the schoolyard and extremely popular with the students.

The Men's Shed is looking for somewhere to store equipment pending (hopefully) the building of our own Shed early next year. People are wanting to donate workshop equipment, benches, furniture etc but we have nowhere to store the items. If anyone has some space they are not using in or around the Buninyong area we would really appreciate it.

After many years of providing low-cost public internet access and running regular computer-related courses in the Buninyong Uniting Church Hall, Buninet has finally closed its doors, due to dwindling community demand.

The Buninet Committee formally wound up its affairs last month and held a supper last week to thank everyone who had helped to keep this valuable service going for more than 10 years.

When it opened in 2001-2, the demand for basic computer instruction was enormous: people flocked to use Buninet's computers and its short courses were booked out fast. Many Buninyong and District residents will be grateful to Buninet volunteers over the years for teaching them the mysteries of email, web browsing, digital imaging, word processing and other computer programs. ABC Open also used the facility from time to time for its workshops.

Thank you Buninet and all who have been associated with it: the Buninyong Uniting Church who initiated the outreach project back in 1999; the Buninet Committee, especially its President, Betty Bunting, who was the backbone of the project from start to finish; all the Volunteer co-ordinators, tutors and helpers; and also the students and computer users who were its mainstay during its lifetime. Buninyong's computer literacy is partly due to you.



Neil Cameron

Graduated from the Melbourne University of Agricultural Science in 1951 with, as Neil puts it, "the odd honour".

He became a livestock farmer in 1952 and for over the last two decades has been exporting cheeses half way round the world from his Meredith Sheep and Goat Dairy.

Neil has been very involved in his community by standing as a councillor on the Bannockburn Shire and sitting on various conservation committees. He has also supported the Woodburn Creek School and the Geelong College as secretary for one and president for the other.

Being a scientist has not prevented Neil from pursuing theological beliefs and as such has been an elder with the Uniting Church since 1956 as he states "struggling to bring the church into the 19th century".

All in all a very interesting and knowledgeable man who is certainly not hesitant to state what he believes and he does believe that our planet is warming since reading, <u>Greenhouse: planning for climate change / edited by G.I. Pearman</u>

CSIRO. Division of Atmospheric Research [Conference Proceedings : 2 versions : 1988] Keywords: Greenhouse effect, Atmospheric - Australia - Congresses.; Australia.; Climatic changes - Australia - Congresses

Twenty four years ago, Neil was made aware that the very delicate balance of our planet is being disturbed by human activity.

Neil has presented his logical and indisputable findings in 4 articles;

- (1) It has rained in Antarctica
- (2) Burning of Fossil Fuels: the Logical Connection with the rise in Atmospheric Carbon Dioxide.
- (3) Carbon Dioxide and Global Temperature
- (4) Earth's Energy Balance and the concept of "Greenhouse".

<u>Carbon dioxide</u>, the Earth' energy balance and the Concept of "Greenhouse". Carbon dioxide is the greenhouse gas which controls the global temperature. Without it our Earth would be a frozen ball. It was identified as such 150 years ago.


This idea, that the atmosphere might help keep the Earth warm, is not new. It was first proposed by Joseph Fourier, formerly a lieutenant of Napoleon during the French Egyptian campaign (1798-1801).

Napoleon put him in charge of the Egyptian Museum, and he also became the munitions expert for France's beleaguered expedition. In 1824, Fourier calculated that the Earth is warmer than to expected on the basis of its radiation balance. He likened the atmosphere to the glass of a greenhouse, retaining some terrestrial radiant heat. (Fourier coined the term Greenhouse Effect; but in reality the glass of a greenhouse conserves heat that is lost by both convection and radiation; whereas only radiation is applicable to global heat loss into space.) In coining the term he was inspired by the Swiss aristocrat and alpine explorer Horace Benedict de Saussure (1740 – 1799), who in the 18th century constructed a solar oven comprising a well insulated vase, black inside and covered by several layers of glass: in which, exposed to the sun atop a mountain, he achieved a temperature of 110 degrees Celsius (230Deg. Fahrenheit). Following Fourier, In 1869, native Irishman John Tyndall, using a spectrometer, identified carbon dioxide, water vapour and ozone (O3) as being relatively opaque to certain wavelengths of the infra-red radiation emanating from the Earth, thereby providing a mechanism for Fourier's suggested 'Greenhouse Effect'. This was quantified in 1896 by the Swedish chemist Svante Arrhenius, who suggested that the warming resultant upon rising CO² levels might be advantageous for cold Sweden.



Prior to the advent of the Industrial Revolution, the incoming and outgoing radiations to and from the earth were in equilibrium. The unprecedented rise in atmospheric carbon dioxide since then has upset that equilibrium.

Thousands attend Melbourne Rally

In Melbourne on Saturday thousands of people gathered on the steps of the State Library to protest the refugee policies of both major political parties.

In an election campaign where both Labor and the Coalition are promoting the most savage antirefugee policies of any developed country, the protesters were defending the right of desperate people to seek asylum from persecution. As many speakers said, seeking asylum is legal and the manner in which people find their way here should not prejudice their appeal for protection.

On Saturday people had travelled from all over Victoria; from Ballarat, Geelong, Bendigo, Gippsland, the Western District, Sale, Maffra, Daylesford, Castlemaine, and Maryborough. White balloons declared "Geelong welcomes Refugees".

The large crowd, carrying banners and placards and accompanied by a lively jazz band, stopped at Liberal headquarters before final speeches to a slightly smaller crowd at the Old Treasury. The crowd stretched from one side of the road to the other and over a city block long.

Pamela Curr, from the Asylum Seeker Resource Centre said, "There are some terrible things happening in this country. There is no doubt that our politicians have gone mad, absolutely stark mad. These are people seeking protection ... we have to fight for their right to seek security – they're human beings and they've got a right, just like us, to live in peace."

Similar rallies were held simultaneously in Sydney, Perth, Brisbane and Canberra as part of a National Day of Action by refugee advocates, with speakers including refugees who have successfully made new lives in Australia.

A further rally is planned for 21 September, to inform whichever party wins the election, that Australians are not happy that our international obligations are being broken by the government.
